When I was in high school, my parents gave me a box of cards titled "God's Promises". Each card had a scripture and promise from God, and the cards are divided into sections: hope, freedom from fear, comfort, healing, and praise and thanksgiving. I find comfort in knowing there are that many promises. Not just one, but many. Our Heavenly Father knows that we need to be told over and over. to be reassured. Isaiah 40:8 says The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God stands forever.(NIV) These promises will be true today, tomorrow, and always.

My verse for this biennium is Psalm 121:1-2 I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord, which made heaven and earth. (KJV)This verse has always been special to me. Growing up in Colorado, the mountains were always present. I find that when I am away, I am very "directionally challenged", because I'm used to looking to the mountains for "west". My mother always told me the mountains were "God's Country." No matter if you feel the same way, our help does not come from the mountains, but from God. But the mountains are a promise of His majesty and power. God knows that we need his visual reminder as well as the spoken promises. We see this reminder every day, everywhere, not just in the mountains. The smoke from the wildfires made the sunsets bright red and vibrant in Denver. That reminds me that even in something horrible and terrifying, there is beauty.

Today, make a point to look for God's promise to you. Once you recognize it, you will see it everywhere and you wonder how you ever went without it before. Luckily we aren't ever without God's promises and presence.

# A PERFECT RECORD

We have all been on the receiving end of broken promises. It's never easy, because it means trust has been broken. In these situations it becomes all too clear that a promise itself is only words, and that the only real *value* of those words is as good as the trustworthiness of the person speaking them.

Isn't it wonderful and remarkable that God has a perfect record of promise keeping? And He has made thousands of them: promises to love us, forgive us, protect us, keep us, guide us, and prosper us, among many others. One should think that there is no one more trustworthy than God! It's ironic, then, if you are anything like me, that it is most difficult to trust in God when life is a struggle and things are not going as desired or planned. I say "ironic" because our trials in life, in reality, only reaffirm God's trustworthiness! We may not want to think about this as much, but in addition to all the comforting promises of God, we also have some more challenging promises: The promise that we Christians will have trouble in this world (John 16), that people will hate us because of our faith (Matt. 10), and that our lives will

be ones afflicted by war, famine, earthquakes, plague, tribulation, persecution, death, lawlessness, and lovelessness (Matt. 24)! And these only scratch the surface of the more challenging promises of God in the scriptures. That being the case, one might say that God is perfectly trustworthy, even when we'd rather He not be!

When things are at their worst in life, the question in our minds then changes from "is God trustworthy," to "is God LOVE-worthy." Indeed, dear Christian friends, He is. This is why we can say as part of our communion liturgy, "it is good, right and salutary at ALL times and in ALL places to give thanks to [God]" – yes, even in times and places of trials and suffering. Why is that? Because God is all in all. He is with us. He loves us. And He has promised us that, even in the worst of times, He is in control and working for the good of those who love Him. (Rom. 8:28). He has overcome the world. He who endures to the end will be saved. We can trust in Him and His love, especially in the most challenging of times.

#### MISSION GRANT UPDATE

We are starting a new biennium and have new mission grants to support. Starting something new can be daunting, but we have the Lord to lean on. God commands us to be His good stewards, and He promises that He will be with us as we do His work. His promises are more than just theological concepts—they are living assurances that profoundly impact our lives and our work. By grounding our efforts in His promises, we can approach our mission grant goals with confidence, hope, and effectiveness.

One mission that we will support this biennium is the Concordia Seminary Food Bank and Re-Sell It Shop which has been in operation on the campus for more than 25 years. They provide vital services to seminary students and are a permanent Concordia Seminary program. The shop helps make life as a

seminarian more affordable by providing essential budget relief to students. Most of Concordia Seminary's students live on tight budgets as they prepare for pastoral and diaconal ministry. The groceries, personal care products, clothing and necessary household items that the shop provides - at no cost in the Food Bank and at very low cost in the Re-Sell It Shop allow seminarians to more fully devote themselves to their studies as they prepare to become pastors, deaconesses and missionaries for the church. May God bless their mission and ours as we enter this new period with God's promises giving us strength!

# **KEEPING UP WITH THE TIMES**

When the Lutheran Women's Missionary League started in 1942, women collected change in Mite Boxes. They were encouraged to:

- Put your pennies in the box at the end of each day.
- Say "thank you" with an appropriate amount whenever calamity or misfortune has been averted.
- Empty all your loose change from your kitchen coin bowl into the box on meeting day.

Times have changed!

The value of \$1 in 1942 is the value of \$19.04 today. Registration fees for a district convention were 10¢ and 25¢ for the national. The first LWML biennium mission goal was \$15,000; the current LWML mission goal is \$2,350,000. To keep up with these developments, we have to encourage giving more than loose change!

In addition, the way that our society interacts with money is changing. A 2007 Pew Survey found that, "nearly three-in-ten adults (28%) say the most common way they take care of their regular monthly bills is by an online or electronic payment." Jump forward 10 years to a survey in 2017 that found, "56% of all bills are paid online today and that most consumers paying online do so via billers' websites rather than via financial institution bill pay or third-party bill pay sites." The study also revealed that, "Millennials and Gen Xers pay the largest proportion of their bills online (61% and 60%, respectively)." The numbers kept rising as a 2019 survey found, "Eighty-three percent of those surveyed expressed a desire to pay with digital convenience, using a mobile device or online platform. While more than 20 percent prefer using a payment app, only about five percent said they want to pay through the mail." These surveys were all done before the 2020 pandemic provided the impetus to move more and more toward online payments.

The LWML RMD wants to keep up with the changing financial times. The Executive Committee researched various platforms and selected the Lutheran Church Extension Fund partnership with Vanco. This platform should be up and running in November.

Adding an online giving option will facilitate mite contributions from our members, expand our donation group to other LCMS congregants, and streamline how we do business by allowing transfers from Groups to District and online payments for District events. We are excited to offer this new option and hope you will find it to be beneficial!

# LWML ACRONYMS

# Have you ever been confused about acronyms in LWML and what they mean? Here are a few of the most common ones:

• **LWML**: Lutheran Women's Missionary League/Lutheran Women in Mission- the Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) is an official auxiliary of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. Since 1942, the LWML has focused on affirming each woman's relationship with Christ, encouraging and equipping women to live out their Christian lives in active mission ministries and to support global missions.

• **YWR**: Young Woman Representative- Any mature young woman, preferably 22-35 years of age\*, who is a member of the LCMS and has not previously ... attended a national convention as a Young Woman Representative is eligible to become a **YWR**. A **YWR** candidate should have a deep love and devotion for her Lord Jesus Christ and is able to participate ... full scope of the convention.

• **LWML RMD**: Rocky Mountain District – Mission Statement: As Lutheran Women in Mission, we joyfully proclaim Christ, support missions, and equip women to honor God by serving others. The LWML Rocky Mt. District is comprised of several states in the southwest. We have Colorado and New Mexico, as well as Vernal, Utah; Page, Arizona; and El Paso, Texas. With such a variety of places, our district is a fascinating place to live and visit. The greatest quality of people in the Rocky Mt. District is that they love the Lord Jesus Christ with all their hearts and let that love shine.

• **SIC**: Sister in Christ - Sharing the faith in Jesus and to have a relationship in the Heavenly Father, whose spirit we share with him and with others.

• Heart to Heart-Sisters of All Nations-The purpose of the Heart to Heart — Sisters of All Nations is to:Motivate, equip, and ensure opportunities for women to serve others, participate in LWML, and grow in relationships as sisters in Christ.

• **EC**: Executive committee - includes the elected and appointed officers for district or national, district EC meets quarterly

• **BOD**: Board of Directors - The executive committee and zone presidents, meet once yearly

• **EPC**: Event Planning Committee: responsible for planning the convention and retreat, meets monthly

• **ID**: Interdepartmental meeting - biannual meeting of national committees and national EC

• **AOL**: Assembly of Leaders: National training meeting for district officers

- **President's Assembly**: National meeting for district presidents
- **PR Dept**: handles communications and publicity for national

• **CWIM**: Church workers in Mission committee: makes resources for church workers on the national level

Life Choices in Longmont wants every client to know they are loved and cared for, even the abortion-minded woman. They give a Mommy Bag to each woman as she is leaving her first appointment to contemplate the difficult decision ahead. Often these women feel judged and ashamed so this is just a little pampering to give them a boost. Nail polish, toiletries, small cosmetic bags, chapstick, hair ties, fuzzy socks, granola bars, gum and mints are a few of the items typically included in these bags. They also have Daddy Bags for the men who come into their center.

Check with your local pregnancy care center if this is a project you or your group would like to champion. Each center operates a little differently; find out the best way to assist the women who are facing unexpected pregnancies in your area.

Please keep pregnancy care centers in your prayers! Life Choices in Longmont was the victim of arson and vandalism right after Roe v. Wade was overturned. It took over a year to refurbish the building. During that time, a local church donated space allowing their ministry to continue nonstop. Due to the outpouring of support and donations, when Life Choices moved back into their building they were able to purchase a second ultrasound machine, giving them the ability to serve more women. God is good! The new interior is inviting and warm. You can get a glimpse of it in the photo below, taken when I delivered our convention Gifts From the Heart.




