#### **CREATION**

From the very beginning in Genesis we are told we were created in God's image

So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. Genesis 1:27

When we see a new baby, we talk about whose eyes, whose nose, and so on when we ought to say we look just like God? I saw a bumper sticker the other day that said "God loves you. But I'm His favorite." Why don't we say these things? I would like to think that it's because it's too presumptive. But, in fact, God thinks that we're special. In Matthew 10 Jesus talks to His disciples about their worth, about how God has numbered every hair on their heads and how they are worth

more than many sparrows. Jesus is reassuring His disciples that they are "seen" and are part of the Divine plan. That is what we all want, to know that we matter and are doing what we are meant to do, right? Because God made us in His image it is our job to be a representative for Him. Redeemed by God through Christ, He is proud to claim you. That doesn't mean we will never make mistakes, but just like our earthly children, we will never be loved any less. Be confident in this assurance, and let it give you the confidence to be a representative for God. You can never "out-sin" God's love, and this should bring us much needed comfort.

#### IN THE BEGINNING

Since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities—his eternal power and divine nature—have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made... Rom. 1:20 (NIV).

What a remarkable verse this is! Can we really know the one, true God's power and divinity from His creation? Evidently, we can! This makes me wonder if we shouldn't spend more time stopping to smell the proverbial roses.

It's easy to find ourselves so distracted by the responsibilities, cares, and pursuits of this life that we walk right past creations of God worthy of our contemplation and admiration without noticing them. This is perhaps especially true for those of us who live in the concrete jungles of cities built by man, where God's creations aren't as readily seen. But if we have eyes for it, we'll find them. What might a browned leaf, falling from a tree after the first cold spell of Winter tell us about God? How about the way a mother bird gathers food for her chicks, or the reliability of the sun's rise over the Eastern horizon every new day? Jesus Himself teaches us to look to creation for specific information about God: Why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labor or spin. Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these. If that is how God clothes the

grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you?" (Matt. 6:28-30 NIV)

God works through cycles and seasons; God provides; God brings life from death; God is powerful; God is wonderful; God is good. All these things, and many more, can be seen and known through His creation. Thanks and praise be to God!

What comes next for us, after we've been taught something about God, be that from creation, or from a faithful person's proclamation of truth, or from a Bible verse? The answer is, we respond. The end of the Romans 1:20 verse quoted at the very beginning of this article states that, because of creation's witness, "people are without excuse." Paul goes on to teach that the more we know about God, the more we should be moved to turn away from Godlessness and wickedness, and move toward glorifying Him with our lives and giving Him thanks. We are to recognize ourselves, too, as God's creatures, not only created by Him, but re-created by His Spirit through His Son, called and equipped to give Him glory, from the rising of the sun to its setting.

## MISSION GRANT UPDATE

For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do. Ephesians 2:10 God's creations are wonderful, but there is little more wonderful than children. We thank God for the people who are taking on the difficult task of caring for and teaching our children. This biennium we are supporting many schools including three different programs for younger children. We are helping Mt. Zion in Boulder, CO rebuild their playground so that they can show people in Boulder what great childcare looks

like. We are also supporting a scholarship for Redeemer Lutheran school to allow a family to take advantage of the great education available at our Lutheran schools. Finally, we are supporting an update to the math curriculum and manipulatives for the school at Trinity Lutheran which will teach kids math while also helping them to learn about God. These are important tasks that will support and strengthen our kids, and plant the seeds of faith which we pray will continue to grow throughout their lives.




Debbie Yocky and Carol Von Soosten gave an interesting presentation centered on how we fit into the Body of Christ.
